A snapshot of Queensland pharmacy sector this year

2025 has been a landmark year for pharmacists in Queensland, marked by expanding scope of practice, new prescribing opportunities, and increasing recognition of pharmacists as essential frontline health professionals. Pharmacists played a central role in immunisation, aged care, and medicines safety initiatives, with strong engagement in policy reform and advocacy. The Community Pharmacy Scope of Practice Pilots continued to demonstrate the profession's capacity to manage common conditions and improve patient access to care.

We kicked off the year with NAPSA Congress hosted in Brisbane. PSA President, Fei Sim, shone bright like a diamond speaking about the future of the pharmacy profession. Thank your pharmacist day was celebrated in March with pharmacist Ken Lai acknowledged for serving the community in Caboolture for over 50 years. PSA hosted three member networking events in Townsville, Cairns and Brisbane, this year trialling a new format combining networking with CPD. We acknowledge the amazing Professor Beverley Glass who lead workshops on conflict management in Townsville and Cairns. PSA was represented by our incredible team at a number of university induction events and award ceremonies.

We acknowledge the nation leading work the Queensland Government is doing in collaboration with the PSA and other key stakeholders including the Pharmacy Guild of Australia and Pharmaceutical Defence Limited.

Highlights this year have included the permanent enablement of the Hormonal Contraception Pilot and the acute conditions arm of the Queensland Community Pharmacy Scope of Practice Pilot, nation leading legislation that enables Collaborative Pharmacist Medication Prescribing in Queensland hospital and health facilities and legislative changes that now mean supervised student pharmacists can administer medicines to their patients.

Despite ongoing workforce pressures, pharmacists across Queensland have shown resilience, leadership, and innovation, strengthening their role within the health system and delivering safe, accessible patient care.

Highlights

- 1880** Inaugural meeting of the Society. First President was Mr E Taylor. Founded as the Pharmaceutical Society of Queensland.
- 1884** Gazettal of the first Pharmacy Act which provided the means for Registration of pharmacists by the Pharmacy Board.
- 1908** Arrival in Queensland of Mr RC Cowley as Director of the Pharmacy College.
- 1912** The Society granted Letters Patent under the Religious, Education and Charitable Institutions Act.
- 1917** Amendments to the Pharmacy Act which required all chemist shops to be under direct management of registered persons.
- 1921** Opening of the Pharmacy College Building.
- 1935** Closure of Pharmacy College Building. Transfer of Pharmacy Education to Central Technical College, George Street.
- 1960** Pharmacy Education becomes the responsibility of the University of Queensland and the three-year BPharm. Degree course commenced.
- 1962** First students of the new B.Pharm Degree course graduated.
- 1973** The University of Queensland Pharmacy Degree moved from George Street to the Steele Building at the St Lucia Campus.
- 1977** Formation of the Pharmaceutical Society of Australia, the federal body representing all State Societies.
- 1980** Bowl of Hygeia Awards commenced, to celebrate the centenary of the Society.
- 1982** Incorporated as the Pharmaceutical Society of Australia (Queensland Branch).
- 1984** Commencement of the Pre-Registration Training Program.
- 1991** Purchased premises at 1 Crown Street, South Brisbane.
- 2000** First students of the new University of Queensland four-year BPharm Degree course graduated.
- 2002** Successful completion of the Society's Pre-Registration Training Program became one of the mandatory requirements before graduates could become registered.
- 2006** First students of the Griffith University combined BPharmSc / MPharm Degrees graduated and were the first group to enter the Pre-Registration Training Program in the first mid-year entry to the Program in 2006.
- 2007** National AGM passed new PSA Constitution allowing incorporation of all state entities into one corporate body.
- 2008** Signing of the Branch National Agreement 13th February 2008 creating one single corporate body operating under one National PSA constitution.
- 2010** PSA Queensland Branch move to the Pharmacy Australia Centre of Excellence (PACE) building co-located with the School of Pharmacy at the University of Queensland.
- 2010** Queensland Mid-Year Intern intake commenced delivery under the National NITP.
- 2014** Queensland Pharmacist Immunisation Pilot (QPIP) Influenza commenced.
- 2015** Queensland Pharmacist Immunisation Pilot (QPIP) expanded to include Pertussis & MMR
- 2016** Queensland Government passed legislation for Queensland pharmacists to administer vaccinations permanently.
- 2018** PSA office moved to 225 Montague Road, West End.
- 2018** Legacy Bowl of Hygeia Award transitioned to Pharmacist of the Year Award criteria for national award consistency.
- 2018** Legacy Gold Medal Award transitioned to Lifetime Achievement Award criteria for national award consistency.
- 2018** Commenced as lead organization, the IPAC project in partnership with NACCHO and JCU across Queensland, Northern Territory and Victoria.
- 2020** Pharmacists authorised to administer Covid-19 vaccinations.
- 2020** Queensland Government commits to work with PSA and other stakeholders to pilot a model of care that embeds transition of care pharmacists in inpatient-care teams and to design and implement a trial of pharmacists practising to their full scope in North Queensland.
- 2021** Pharmacists scope of practice expanded to administer influenza and COVID-19 to people 5 years and over.
- 2021** Temporary expansion of locations (e.g., in aged care facilities, general practice, ACCHOs) where pharmacists are authorised to administer influenza and COVID-19 vaccinations.
- 2021** Urinary Tract Infection Pharmacy Pilot (UTIPPQ) commences.
- 2021** Launch of the PSA Communities of Specialty Interest
- 2022** Pilot of pharmacists administering funded National Immunisation Program (NIP) influenza vaccination for people 65 years and over.
- 2022** Urinary Tract Infection Pharmacy Service permanently enabled in legislation
- 2023** Queensland pharmacists are the first in Australia to be authorised to administer influenza vaccines to children younger than 5 years of age.
- 2024** Queensland Community Pharmacy Scope of Practice Pilot and Hormonal Contraception Pilot commenced
- 2025** Pharmacist prescribing for a range of acute conditions permanently enabled in Queensland and Collaborative Pharmacist Medication Prescribing permitted in public and private hospitals

Pharmacist of the Year (legacy Bowl of Hygeia)

The Bowl of Hygeia was introduced in 1980 to commemorate the Centenary of the Pharmaceutical Society of Queensland. Awarded to pharmacists who demonstrated a consistently high standard of professional practice in support of the principles of pharmacy service to the community. The Bowl of Hygeia Award also recognised an exceptional individual service to the profession.

Since 2018, the Pharmacist of the Year Award has recognised pharmacists who have made a significant contribution to the profession. Nominations must address at least one of the following key areas: Pharmacy Practice Research, Pharmacy Practice Innovation, Pharmacy as a Community Service, or Advancing Pharmacy Practice.

From the Queensland President – *Hannah Knowles*



As I sit down to write my first President's Report, I do so with deep admiration for the legacy of the Pharmaceutical Society of Queensland and the generations of pharmacists who have shaped our profession. I extend my sincere thanks to the Queensland Branch Committee for their hard work,

collaboration, and unwavering dedication in shaping and supporting our shared vision for the future. I would especially like to acknowledge my predecessor, Shane MacDonald, whose steady leadership, commitment, and service have guided PSQ through a period of significant change. Shane's dedication to the profession and to our members has laid strong foundations for the work that continues today, and I am grateful for his ongoing support as we navigate this new chapter together.

2025 has been a landmark year for pharmacists in Queensland. It has been a year defined by expanding scope of practice, new prescribing opportunities, and continued recognition of pharmacists as essential frontline health professionals. Across immunisation, aged care, and medicines safety, pharmacists have demonstrated their unwavering commitment to delivering safe and accessible care. The Community Pharmacy Scope of Practice Pilots again highlighted the profession's ability to manage common conditions and improve timely access for patients statewide.

The year saw PSA active across Queensland, with a range of member networking and CPD events held across the state. We held the Annual Therapeutic Update in October 2025 and were proud to celebrate five outstanding pharmacists for their commitment to excellence in pharmacy practice. I admire the passion, community involvement, dedication, and impact that each of them continues to have in their workplaces, communities, and across Australia.

This year also brought significant regulatory and policy achievements. We acknowledge the Queensland Government for its nation-leading work, undertaken in close collaboration with PSA and key partners. Major milestones included the permanent enablement of the Hormonal Contraception Pilot, continuation of the acute conditions arm of the Scope Pilot, legislation enabling Collaborative Pharmacist Medication

Prescribing in hospital and health services, and changes allowing supervised student pharmacists to administer medicines. Despite workforce pressures, Queensland pharmacists have again demonstrated resilience and leadership, strengthening their role within the health system.

A major focus of 2025 has been ensuring that PSQ's assets continue to meaningfully support the profession into the future. During the year, PSQ sold its property at 63 Annerley Road, Woolloongabba, with the proceeds, after all debts and liabilities, donated to PSA Ltd and the PSA Foundation Ltd. We also transferred the Hugh and Mary Darragh Trust funds to the PSA Foundation. These actions reflect our commitment to ensuring that PSQ's legacy will continue to empower the profession for decades to come.

The PSA Foundation has already put these funds to good use. Initiatives supported this year include Mental Health First Aid scholarships, the Maudsley Deprescribing Guidelines eBook project, and innovation programmes such as the national Shark Tank sponsorship. I am delighted to share that the Foundation will also establish a new Hugh and Mary Darragh Trust Scholarship, with applications now open.

On 27 November, members unanimously voted to formally wind up PSQ in accordance with our Constitution. While this is a moment of deep reflection, it is also one of pride. PSQ has represented Queensland pharmacists for decades, and through this decision, its legacy will continue through PSA Ltd, the PSA Foundation, and the dedicated work of the Queensland Branch Committee. This step aligns with the Pharmaceutical Societies Transition Agreement, reduces duplication, strengthens governance, and ensures Queensland pharmacists remain central to PSA's national strategy.

In early 2026, we will come together for a celebration of legacy event to honour PSQ's history and announce the inaugural Hugh and Mary Darragh Scholarship recipient. This will be a special opportunity to reflect on our shared journey and celebrate our collective achievements.
